Hello From Irene Watkins Interim Chief operating officer

Hi – it's my pleasure to introduce myself to you through the pages of Volunteer News. For many reasons it has been a very busy and sometimes unsettling time since I joined the team at Prospect Hospice. I have wanted and tried where possible to meet with volunteers, to find out more about what you do for the hospice, what it is that motivates you and what you find rewarding about volunteering. I will continue to do this because I find it inspiring that people like yourselves will give their time and skills freely to Prospect Hospice.

I would like to tell you where Prospect Hospice is now, and how I see us working towards the future. It has been a difficult time for all staff, and the Care Quality Commission (CQC)'s inspection has brought some hard lessons for staff and volunteers. The follow-up media coverage has been hard to take, for the team at the hospice and for many of you too, I know. But I am confident now that we have begun to put much of this behind us and to move forward.

The CQC wanted to see evidence that we have made changes in how the hospice is run and how it is led. In the time that I have been here I know that we have made the changes that have been asked of us, and that we have a wealth of evidence that demonstrates that we have learned and that we are an improving organisation. There's no room for complacency though. When the CQC return, as we expect them to in the

new year, we should expect that they will closely scrutinise all aspects of our work. It is the determination and commitment of the staff and volunteers at Prospect Hospice that gives me most confidence for the future. So many of the people I have met speak so positively about the work that we do

Thank you for your contribution as a volunteer to Prospect Hospice during 2018. Through you, the patients and families we support experience the care that gave Prospect Hospice its excellent reputation for 38 years. We couldn't do all that we do without you.

And finally, I'd like to wish you a peaceful Christmas and a happy, healthy 2019.

Inpatient Unit training... Prospect Hospice

For three days in November and early December, nine prospective volunteers took part in our new and revised IPU induction. Building on the well-received one-day induction delivered by nurse Helen Brewin, the extra days cover topics including;

- the skills and attributes you need to be an IPU volunteer
- what you can expect to experience on the unit: emotional resilience
- diversity and respecting difference; the Mental Capacity Act, and infection control.

Staff from across the organisation were involved in the delivery of sessions, and participants also learned from the wisdom of more established volunteers – many thanks to Helen Paige, Liz Hews and Neil Slingsby for helping to deliver the training.

The new recruits built up quite a rapport over the course of the three days, and this will no doubt help in terms of peer support as they begin their roles on the unit.

Supporting the Community

With Prospect Hospice needing the support of its local community to deliver our services we decided that in 2018 we would proactively link up with more of our community partners to help and support more people through volunteering.



With great links in place already with the Volunteer Centre in Swindon we have this year been able to help several people through the Building Bridges programme that offers people the opportunity to gain confidence and skills to move towards the world of work.

We have also successfully introduced four volunteers into our shop and distribution network via Swindon Borough Council's Health and Social care programme and the momentum is really building in this area.

Barbara from our warehouse said: "We have a number of roles for people to do but we always offer a taster session first, so they can come along and try things before committing to a regular shift."



The ASDAN Programme

We have been working with The Commonweal School to offer volunteering opportunities under the ASDAN Programme for young students who have learning difficulties. The project involves three students visiting our Regent Street and Gorse Hill shops with their teachers on a fortnightly basis to help sort customer donations and display items for resale. This gives them the opportunity to do something different but at the same time help build their social skills.

Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme

September is a very busy time in Retail as we have a high number of young students contacting us to volunteer as part of their Duke of Edinburgh award scheme.

We have successfully been able to place a total of 12 students across six of our shops, providing them with weekend volunteering. Feedback has shown us that after their scheme is complete, some stay on as regular volunteers because they enjoy the activities and atmosphere.

Investing in Volunteers



Those of you who have been volunteering for at least three years will remember that in 2016 Prospect Hospice was awarded the Investing in Volunteers award. This recognises good practice in volunteer management, and is held by only a handful of hospices throughout the UK.

The accolade is awarded for three years, after which we are re-assessed to determine whether we should retain it for a further three years. Assessors consider the feedback we receive from our volunteers, the processes we have in place and the way volunteering is managed by the staff teams across the organisation. Not only is it an excellent hallmark of quality which is sought out by prospective volunteers deciding where to donate their time, but it also encourages us to review practice on a continuous basis, developing and improving the volunteering experience year on year.

Our next assessment is due in July 2019. Although this might seem like a long time away, we will be thinking about planning communication and evidence-collecting soon after Christmas, so watch this space for more information as we prepare for our summer assessment.
